"Un-disciplining Ethnomusicology: Looking Backward and Forward at the Study of Music and Sound"

Looking back on the 1987 discussion of Tim Rice's "Remodeling Ethnomusicology" in Ethnomusicology and at his "Disciplining Ethnomusicology" in 2010, looking forward toward a February 25th debate at Kings College London, and imagining some of the directions of institutions and research in the coming years, this presentation will suggest the un-disciplining of research on sound and music. Comparing Emile Durkheim's descriptions of the collective effervescence of Australian Aboriginal rituals with the creative effervescence of the musical scenes of many port cities in the 19th and 20th centuries, considering the structure of universities and careers for ethnomusicologists, and employing a pilfered banana and a sharp knife, the presentation will offer the author's perspective on a number of the topics highlighted in the call for papers for the 2016 MACSEM conference in Charlottesville.
